Plainview-Old Bethpage Sixth Graders Earn Top Honors in National Science Competition

The Plainview-Old Bethpage Central School District is proud to announce that four POB Middle School sixth graders have won second place in the national level of the 2011 Toshiba ExploraVision Science Competition.

Thomas Venezia, Sophie Heiman, Alexandra Fryman and Philip Danziger, with the help of teacher/coach Paula Engel, entered the ExploraVision Competition after creating a prototype for a device they dubbed "BlindSight." The device, consisting of an HD nano-camera embedded in a contact lens, would send video and images to a microchip implanted in the brain of a sight-impaired person. The microchip would then process and store the visual data, allowing the blind person not only to "see," but also to remember the images perfectly.

The project was a top submission in the ExploraVision Competition, which encourages students to use their imaginations to create projects with technology that does not yet exist. Out of 4,800 teams to enter in the competition's fourth-through-sixth-grade division, only six, including the BlindSight team – were recognized as regional winners. The POB team's innovative device earned each student member, as well as the team coach, a \$5,000 savings bond and an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C., where they were recognized as the second-place winners at a special awards ceremony. The students also participated in a Congressional Science Fair and Hearing hosted by the House Science and Technology Committee.

In order to create their proposal, the team performed extensive research, including conducting studies on specific areas of the brain and their functions, the different types of memory and the various causes of blindness. The team also researched recent breakthroughs in technology providing aid to the blind, including BrainPort – a device that translates information from a digital video camera to the tongue through gentle electrical stimulation.

Dear Community Residents,

As we prepare to meet these challenges, we have to be ready to abandon some of our favorite lessons and programs while steadfastly holding on to what is essential in learning. It will not be easy to find a consensus about what must be maintained while also identifying the innovations that must be sought.

Education has become a topic rich with controversy expressed in every form of media. Evaluation, tests and assessments, and common standards are the current issues. The debate is good, but we must be careful to avoid the stalemates of the past or we will get locked in arguments and never move forward. The educational outcomes for the children in our community matter, not to some citizens, but to all. Nationally and locally, we need to build common understandings about what matters and how we might achieve it together.

On May 17, district residents came out to the polls and approved the 2011-12 school budget by a margin of 2,095 to 1,136. Proposition II, authorizing the expenditure of the capital reserve fund, passed by a margin of 2,230 to 936. Incumbents Debbie Bernstein and Ginger Lieberman were re-elected to the Board of Education. The Board will hold its annual reorganization meeting on Tuesday, July 5 at 7 p.m.

The Plainview-Old Bethpage School District is committed to providing an academically challenging and stimulating educational experience for all students, designed to meet their individual needs and prepare them to excel in a wide range of endeavors. At the same time, we are committed to fulfilling our responsibility to you, the taxpayers, by diligently controlling costs. By approving the capital reserve expenditure and combining it with the capital funds in the budget, community members have made it possible for the district to invest over \$5 million toward improvements through infrastructure and facility construction. K-Center Students Enjoy a Fascinating Study in Biology

Children in Fran Ferrucci and Robbin Sigman's kindergarten classes recently explored the four stages of a butterfly's metamorphosis: egg, larva (caterpillar), pupa (chrysalis) and adult (butterfly). By making critical observations of actual caterpillars, keeping a journal and reading children's literature on butterfly life, the students were able to learn and make predictions about the metamorphosis process. At the end of the study and transformation, the children released the newly formed butterflies into their natural habitat.




Spanish Poetry Contest Winner
